How It Works

For Educators

Educators at any level, from elementary through high school, from any subject area are eligible to apply for the Externship

Teachers complete an application. Participants are selected and notified.

Educators participate in an orientation to businesses and industry with the help of local public officials, representatives of higher education, and group tours to facilities not suitable for multi day externship.

Educators are assigned a specific advanced manufacturer and later spend up to a week for an intense learning experience.

Post Externship

Educators are provided a day of in-service to gather their thoughts, prepare a group presentation to share with local stake holders.

Upon successful completion of the externship, educators are awarded a \$1,500 stipend. (Through the HCWEP)

Where We Are

By the year 2025, **55% or more** jobs in Tennessee will require some kind of postsecondary education.

Too many students graduate from high school and enter the workforce with limited skills, no postsecondary education and *earn far less* than their peers with post-secondary degrees.
